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Introduction

County Demographic Profile

Duval County is located in northeast Florida, and is bordered by St. Johns, Clay, Bradford, Baker, and Nassau County. The 2017 U.S. Census estimated that Duval County's 18 years of age and older population was approximately 704,409 individuals. The approximate racial/ethnic breakdown for the total Duval County population of 912,043 individuals according to the 2017 American Community Survey (ACS) Census Bureau is as follows: 54% white non-Hispanic, 29% black non-Hispanic, 9% Hispanic/Latino origin, and 5% Asian non-Hispanic.

Executive Summary

This report was prepared for the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office (JSO) following the administration of the JSO Community Survey. The conclusions and opinions expressed in this report do not necessarily represent those of JSO. This report serves to gauge community perceptions of public safety in Jacksonville, Florida (not including the Beaches Communities). In order to best accomplish this, the Public Opinion Research Laboratory (PORL) at the University of North Florida (UNF) conducted a survey that yielded the following results:

- The overwhelming majority, 71 percent, of Jacksonville residents approve (strongly or somewhat) of the way the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office is handling its job.
- In 2018, white, black, and Hispanic residents all have greater than 60 percent approval for JSO (79 percent, 62 percent, and 64 percent, respectively.)
- Most Jacksonville residents, 85 percent, agree (strongly or somewhat) that they feel safe in their neighborhood.
- In the total sample of Jacksonville residents, 78 percent agree (strongly or somewhat) that JSO personnel are courteous and competent
- Of those respondents who do not think JSO personnel are courteous and competent (strongly or somewhat disagree), 30 percent said they felt that way because JSO personnel were rude, arrogant, unfriendly, or mean.
- Most Jacksonville residents, 52 percent, think JSO does a good job investigating officerinvolved shootings.
- A majority of black respondents, 63 percent, strongly or somewhat agree that being the victim of police brutality is something they personally worry about.
- Most Jacksonville residents, 67 percent, strongly or somewhat agree that JSO needs more funding.
- "Increase Patrols/Visibility/Presence" is the most popular response (45 percent) when residents

- were asked what one thing JSO could do for them in their neighborhood.
- ➤ Half of the sample, 50 percent, would be willing to have direct interaction with a JSO officer.

Methodology

Study Design

The PORL administered a telephone survey from November 30, 2018 through December 13, 2018, To ensure a representative sample was being collected, the county was stratified using the 6 JSO patrol zones, which are broken down into sectors and sub-sectors so that officers can easily navigate and find neighborhoods within the community (see Table 1). Quotas were placed on each of these stratified areas to ensure a proportionate amount of completed surveys from across the zones. Quotas were set for 300 completed surveys per patrol zone (with the exception of the lightly populated Patrol Zone 1 n=214) in order to decrease the margin of error when cross analyzing one patrol zone to another. It is important to understand and recognize the n (sample size) when comparing these patrol zones as their margins of error are higher, meaning there is more uncertainty towards the true population.

Data collection took place at the PORL facility with its 27-station Computer Assisted Telephone Interviewing (CATI) system. A sample of the polling universe (Florida residents) was selected through the use of Random-Digit-Dialing methodology for both landlines and cell phones. Survey Sampling International provided all of the telephone numbers used for the survey. For individuals answering on a landline telephone, the interviewer asked the first qualified respondent to participate. Cell phone sample respondents were selected by being the first qualified participant to answer the phone.

The breakdown of completed responses on a landline phone to a cell phone was 33% to 67% with less than 1% unknown. The sample is composed of adults (18 years and older) who live in Duval County (not including the Beaches Communities).

A maximum of 5 callbacks were attempted for non-completes with a working residential or cell phone line. To avoid survey bias, surveys were conducted in both English and Spanish. Calls were made from 1:00 p.m. - 9:00 p.m. seven days a week. The total number of completed surveys collected was 1,726.

In order to adjust for oversampling and to correct for non-response bias, weights were applied to the data. The approaches to weighting first included adjusting for the over-sampled patrol zones; those that were oversampled needed to have their values adjusted downward so as not to bias the countywide results. Second, in order to ensure that the results presented were reflective of the adult population of Duval County,

the total sample was weighted by age, sex, race, and education to the estimated 2017 American Community Survey for the adult population of the State of Florida. There were no statistical adjustments made due to design effects.

The demographic questions used for weighting were age, race, sex, and education. For these questions, if 'Don't Know' or 'Refusal' were selected then they were given a weight of 1. The margin of sampling error for the total sample is +/- 2 percentage points (see Table 2). American Association of Public Opinion Research (AAPOR) Response Rate 3 (RR3) calculation was used which consists of an estimate of what proportion of cases of unknown eligibility are truly eligible. This study had a 23% response rate.





Summary of Findings

Figure 1. JSO Approval by Patrol Zone, 2018

Do you approve or disapprove of the way the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office is handling its job?



In Figure 1, respondent's approval of JSO is broken out by which patrol zone they live in. The greatest approval can be seen in zones 3 and 6 with 77% approval for JSO, followed by patrol zone 4 with 72% approval. Zone 1 has the least approval of JSO, with 60% agreeing strongly or somewhat. Overall, approval for JSO is at 71%.

Do you approve or disapprove of the way the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office is handling its job?




Figure 2 portrays JSO approval in 2018 by respondent race. As the graph illustrates, approval is greatest among white respondents, with 79% approving strongly

or somewhat of JSO, higher than the sample average of 71%. Black and Hispanic respondents have lower approval, with 62% and 64% respectively.

Agree or Disagree: You feel safe in your neighborhood





Figure 3 shows the percentage of respondents that agree to feeling safe in their neighborhood by patrol zone. More than 75% of respondents in all zones agree strongly or somewhat that they feel safe in their

neighborhood, with zone 3 at the highest agreement level (94%). The lowest percent of agreement, 77%, is in Zone 1. Overall, 85% of the sample agree that they feel safe in their neighborhood.

Agree or Disagree: You feel safe in the areas of Jacksonville that you go most often, for example for work or leisure



Respondents were also asked how safe they felt in areas of Jacksonville they often frequented, displayed above in Figure 4. Zone 3 has the highest agreement with 87% agreeing strongly or somewhat. The least

amount of agreement for feeling safe in areas the respondents go often is in Zone 5, with 71%. Overall, agreement is at 80% for 2018.

Agree or Disagree: You think Jacksonville is, overall, a safe place to live





Figure 5 details respondents that believe that Jacksonville is a safe place to live overall. There's not a great deal of variation across zones, with the highest agreement in zone 2 at 67% and the lowest in zone 4

with 59%. For the entire sample, 64% agree strongly or somewhat that Jacksonville is overall a safe place to live.

Agree or Disagree: In your encounters with JSO personnel, you find them to be courteous and competent




In Figure 6, respondents were asked about their perceptions of JSO personnel. Zone 1 reports the least agreement that JSO personnel are courteous and competent with 69%. Agreement is highest in Zone 6

with 81%, followed closely by zone 2 with 79%. Overall, 78% of the sample agree that they find JSO to be courteous and competent.

Why have you found their behavior to be discourteous or incompetent?




In Figure 7, respondents that did not believe JSO personnel were courteous and competent were asked to elaborate on why they found them to be discourteous and incompetent. Their responses were then coded to fit into the categories displayed above. Respondents that

believe JSO personnel to be

"Rude/Arrogant/Unfriendly/Mean" come in at 30% in 2018, the highest percentage of any category. The next most popular response is "Lack of Action/Don't Do Their Job" at 14%, followed by "Racial Profiling/Stereotyping" and "Bad Personal Experience", both at 11%.

In Figure 8, respondents that did not believe JSO personnel were courteous and competent were asked to elaborate on why they found them to be discourteous and incompetent. Their responses were then coded to fit into the categories displayed above. A majority of

respondents in Zone 3 report JSO officers to be "Rude/Arrogant/Unfriendly/Mean", while Zone 2 has the largest percentage of "Lack of Action" at 24%. 19% of Zones 1 and 5% report "Racial Profiling/Stereotyping/Harassment" from JSO officers.

Why have you found their behavior to be discourteous or incompetent?





Figure 9 displays the same question as Figure 7 and Figure 8, this time broken down by the respondent's race. "Rude/Arrogant/Unfriendly/Mean" is the most popular response among all racial groups, although "Racial Profiling/Stereotyping" is most prominent among black respondents at 20%, followed by 13% of Hispanic respondents. White respondents are much less likely than minority respondents to see "Excessive"

Force/Aggressive" as an issue, at 3% compared to the 10% and 13% from black and Hispanic respondents, respectively. White respondents are also much more likely to say that JSO personnel are discourteous and incompetent due to "Inflated Sense of Authority" than minority respondents, with 13% compared to 5% and 3% from black and Hispanic respondents, respectively.

Figure 10. JSO Complex Investigations by Patrol Zone, 2018






Figure 10 shows the agreement for JSO handling of complex investigations by patrol zone. Zone 6 has the greatest agreement, with 69% who strongly or somewhat agree. The next highest agreement is in zone 3 with

60%. Zones 1 and 2 have below 50% agreement, with 49% agreeing strongly or somewhat that JSO does a good job handling complex investigations.

Agree or Disagree: Overall, JSO does a good job handling complex investigations




Figure 11 shows the same question as Figure 10 but broken out by race. White respondents have the greatest amount of agreement at 60%, followed by black respondents at 54%. Hispanic respondents have less

than 50% agreement, with 44% in 2018 who agree that JSO does a good job in their handling of complex investigations.

Agree or Disagree: JSO does a good job investigating officer-related shootings





Figure 12 displays agreement that JSO does a good job in investigating officer-related shootings by patrol zone. Zone 6 has the greatest level of agreement with 60% strongly or somewhat agreeing, followed closely by zone 3 with 59% agreement. The rest of the zones have less

than 50% agreement, with zone 1 having the lowest with 40% agreement. Overall, 52% of the sample agree that JSO does a good job in their investigations of officer-related shootings.

Agree or Disagree: JSO does a good job investigating officer-related shootings




Similar to Figure 12, Figure 13 shows agreement of JSO's handling of investigations into officer-related shootings, this time broken out by race. Agreement among white respondents is greatest out of all the race

categories with 60%. Black and Hispanic respondents have less than 50% agreement, with 46% and 40% strongly or somewhat agreeing, respectively.

Figure 14. JSO Police Misconduct by Patrol Zone, 2018

Agree or Disagree: JSO does a good job of following up on allegations of police misconduct with competent administrative and/or criminal investigations



Respondents were asked about how JSO does in following up on allegations of police misconduct in Figure 14. Zone 6 had the greatest level of agreement, with 60% strongly or somewhat agreeing. This was closely followed by zone 3 with 56% agreement. The

rest of the zones have less than 50% in agreement, with zone one having the lowest at 37% agreement. The overall sample shows 51% of the population believe that JSO does a good job following up on allegations of police misconduct.

Agree or Disagree: JSO does a good job of following up on allegations of police misconduct with competent administrative and/or criminal investigations




Figure 15 is the same question as Figure 14, broken down by race group. There is higher disagreement among black respondents with the statement than

agreement, with 41% in agreement. White and Hispanic respondents maintained agreement of at least 50%, with white respondents at 58% agreement.

Figure 16. JSO Reporting Back by Patrol Zone, 2018

Agree or Disagree: JSO does a good job of reporting back to the community about its findings on investigations of possible police misconduct




Figure 16 portrays the agreement that JSO does a good job in reporting back findings of possible police misconduct by patrol zone. Zone 3 has the highest level of agreement, with 62% strongly or somewhat agreeing,

followed closely by zone 6 at 61%. Zones 1 and 5 have the lowest level of agreement at 43%. Overall, three zones have less than 50% in agreement. Of the total sample, 53% are in agreement.

Agree or Disagree: JSO does a good job of reporting back to the community about its findings on investigations of possible police misconduct





Figure 16 and Figure 17 ask the same question, but Figure 17 is broken down by race. Black respondents have the lowest level of agreement at 43%. More Hispanic respondents agree than black respondents at

48%, but their agreement rate is still less than 50%. White respondents have the highest level of agreement at 62%.

Figure 18. Victim of Police Brutality by Patrol Zone, 2018






Figure 18 displays respondents who agree that being the victim of police brutality is something they personally worry about by the six patrol zones. Zones 1 and 6 have the highest levels of agreement with 49%, followed

closely by Zone 5 with 48% agreement. Zone 3 has the least amount of agreement, at 25%. Overall, 35% of Jacksonville residents agree that being the victim of police brutality is something they personally worry about.

Agree or Disagree: Being the victim of police brutality is something you personally worry about




Figure 19 shows the full agreement and disagreement selection for the police brutality question by race. White respondents have the highest levels of disagreement, with 66% strongly disagreeing and 15% somewhat disagreeing, for a total disagreement of 81%. Most Hispanic respondents disagree as well, with a total

disagreement of 58%. Black respondents see an opposite trend, with 41% strongly agreeing with the statement and 22% somewhat agreeing, for a total agreement of 63%. Though more study is required to fully understand the finding, national trends are likely the driving force behind these results.

Agree or Disagree: JSO needs more funding




Figure 20 shows agreement that JSO needs more funding by patrol zone. Zones 4 and 5 have the highest rate of agreement at 72% and 73%, respectively. On the other hand, zone 1 has the lowest level of agreement, with 61% of respondents strongly or somewhat agreeing

that JSO needed more funding. It's important to note that all zones have well over 50% of respondents in agreement. 67% of the total sample agree that JSO needs more funding.

Agree or Disagree: JSO needs more funding




Figure 21 shows agreement for JSO funding by race. 70% of white respondents strongly or somewhat agree that JSO needs more funding. This is closely followed by

black respondents, at 69%. Hispanic respondents have the lowest level of agreement at 63%. It should be noted that all race categories have agreement of over 50%.

Agree or Disagree: JSO has enough officers to meet the city's needs





Figure 22 displays agreement for JSO having enough officers to meet the city's needs by patrol zone. Zone 4 has the lowest level of agreement, with 33% of respondents strongly or somewhat agreeing that JSO

has enough officers. Zones 1 and 6 have the highest level of agreement at 41%, and 38% of the total sample agree that JSO had enough officers. None of the patrol zones have over 50% agreement.

Agree or Disagree: JSO has enough officers to meet the city's needs




Figures 22 and 23 ask the same question, but Figure 23 is broken down by race. 42% of both Hispanic and black respondents agree that JSO had enough officers to meet

the city's needs. White respondents have a lower level of agreement at 35%, and no race category has greater than 50% agreement.

Agree or Disagree: JSO is responsible with taxpayer money and allocates its resources well



Respondents in Figure 24 agree that JSO is responsible with taxpayer money and allocates resources well. More than 50% of the total population believe that JSO is responsible with taxpayer money and allocates its resources well. Zone 6 has the highest level of

respondents who agree, with 64% somewhat or strongly agreeing. Conversely, zone 1 has the lowest level of agreement at 41%. Half of the patrol zones have under 50% agreement: zone 1, zone 4, and zone 5.

Agree or Disagree: JSO is responsible with taxpayer money and allocates its resources well




Figure 25 shows agreement for the statement by race. 60% of white respondents strongly or somewhat agree that JSO is responsible with taxpayer money and allocates its resources well. Black respondents have the lowest level of agreement, with 44% of black

respondents strongly or somewhat agreeing. Less than 50% of black and Hispanic respondents believe JSO is responsible with taxpayer money and allocates resources well.

Have you called the police in the past year?




Figure 26 portrays those respondents who had called the police in the past year broken out by patrol zone. Less than 40% of the sample overall and each zone report calling the police within the past year. At 34%,

zone 5 has the highest percentage of respondents who have called the police in the past year. Zone 6 reports the lowest level of respondents who called the police in the past year, at 24%.

Was it an emergency 9-1-1 call or was it a non-emergency call to the police department?




Figure 27 portrays those who indicated that they called only the emergency number when they called the police within the past year. Only 31% of the total sample report calling the emergency number. Zone 1 has the largest

portion of respondents who state they called the police, followed by zone 3 (37% and 35%, respectively). Zone 4 reports calling 9-1-1 the least, at 23%.

Was it an emergency 9-1-1 call or was it a non-emergency call to the police department?




Figure 28 displays those who indicated that they called only the non-emergency number when they called the police within the past year. Zone 4 respondents report the highest number of non-emergency phone calls, 61%.

Zone 1 reports the lowest level of non-emergency phone calls at 40% and is the only zone under 50%. 55% of the total sample reported making a non-emergency call within the past year.

How many times did you call Emergency 9-1-1 in the past year?




Figure 29 displays the mean number of emergency calls for each patrol zone, as well as the total for Duval County. In 2018, zone 1 had the highest mean for emergency calls, with an average of 2.4 calls. The

lowest average is in Zone 2, with an average of 1.4 calls. The overall average for Jacksonville residents in 2018 is 1.9, almost 2, emergency calls in the past year.

Figure 30. Number of Non-Emergency Calls by Patrol Zone, 2018

How many times did you call the non-emergency police number in the past year?




Figure 30 displays the mean number of non-emergency calls as opposed to the emergency calls for 2018. Similar to Figure 29, Zone 1 has the highest average of non-emergency calls in 2018 with 2.7 calls.

Zone 3 has the lowest average in 2018, with 1.7 nonemergency calls in the past year. The average for the total sample was 2.1 calls in 2018.

Have you had NON-EMERGENCY contact with JSO in the past year?




Figure 31 reports the respondents who said yes to having had non-emergency contact with JSO in the past year. 44% of the total sample claim to have had non-emergency contact with JSO in 2018. Zone two has the highest percentage of those who had non-emergency

contact at 51%. Meanwhile, zone 1 has the lowest amount of stated contact at 32%. With the exception of zone 2, less than 50% of respondents from every zone report having had non-emergency contact with JSO.

If JSO could do one thing for you in your neighborhood, what would it be?




Figure 32 shows the categories for how respondents answered when asked what one thing JSO could do for them in their neighborhood. By far, the most popular response for 2018 is "Increase Patrols/Visibility

/Presence" at almost half the sample (45%). At 7%, the next highest responses is "Increase Community Outreach" and "Nothing", followed by "Stronger Speed Enforcement" and "Narrow Specific Issue" at 6%.

Thinking about news, which of the following options would you most prefer for getting your local news?




Figure 33 asks respondents their preference for receiving local news. At over half the sample, "Watching local TV news" is the most selected response (53%).

"Getting local news from social media site" and "Getting local news from online website apps" are two close seconds at 16% and 14%, respectively.

During a typical week, how many days do you watch local news on TV, not including sports?




Figure 34 shows the mean number of days that respondents report watching local news on TV by patrol zone. Responses range from 3.6 to 4.6 across 2018, with Zone 3 at the low end of 3.6 mean days, and Zone

5 at the high end with 4.6 mean days in 2018. Overall, the population reports watching the local news on average 4 days a week.

During a typical week, how many days do you read the local news in a printed newspaper, not including sports?




Figure 35 is the mean number of days that respondents report reading the local news in a newspaper by patrol zone. Compared to Figure 34, the mean number of days

is much lower. There's not much variation among the zones, as most respondents tend to read the local news in a newspaper 1 day a week.

Figure 36. Local News on Internet, 2018




Figure 36 displays the mean number of days respondents received local news on the Internet by patrol zone. Zones 1 and 5 have the lowest average of 3.2 days. Zone 2 has the highest average of 2018, with

4.3 average days. In total, respondents receive local news on the internet almost 4 days a week, with an average of 3.7 days.

Figure 37. Local News on Internet by Race, 2018




Figure 37 is a presentation of the average number of days respondents received local news via the Internet broken down by race. Hispanic respondents had a

higher average, at 4.3 days per week. White and black respondents have the same average of 3.7 days of news consumption through the Internet.

Figure 38. Local News on Internet by Age, 2018




Figure 38 again shows the local news received via Internet, this time broken out by age categories. Ages 18-34 tend to have higher averages for local news

consumed online compared to those 35 and older, as the average begin to trend down towards 2 and 3 days a week as opposed to 4 and 5.

Figure 39. Local News on Internet by Sex, 2018




Figure 39 has the final Internet news breakdown by respondent sex. Men seem to consume local news on the Internet slightly more often than women, with

averages of 4 days a week compared to 3.5 days per week for women.

Figure 40. JSO Social Media by Zone, 2018




Figure 40 displays the percentage of respondents that would follow JSO on various social media platforms by patrol zone. Facebook by far has the most people willing to or already following JSO. Zone 1 has the lowest

percentage of 2018 with 33%, while Zone 4 has 45%. Twitter and Instagram are next most popular, with YouTube keeping up in Zones 4, 5, and 6, but falling behind in Zones 1 and 3.

When it comes to social media, do you or would you follow JSO on these platforms?





Figure 41 also has would or do follow JSO on social media broken down by race. Hispanic respondents are most likely to select Facebook at 53%, follow by white respondents with 40% and black respondents with 36%.

Again, Twitter and Instagram are both close seconds, with YouTube as the least popular choice for all race groups.

Those willing to or already following JSO on social media are displayed in Figure 42, this time broken out by age groups. Younger age groups, like 18-24 year olds and 25-34 year olds are the most likely to follow JSO on all social media platforms, most notably Facebook with 41% and 59%, respectively. However, older age groups




Figure 44. Respondent Age, 2018





What is your highest grade in school or year of college you have completed?



What is your racial background? Is it:



Are we reaching you today on a landline or cell phone?





What language was this survey completed in?


